3. Stakes Clarification: The importance of the Philosopher's Stone could be established earlier and more clearly to build tension from the start. The audience needs to understand the consequences of Voldemort obtaining it sooner.
4. Third Act Structure: The series of magical challenges leading to the Stone could be condensed for better pacing while maintaining the most cinematically compelling elements.

Specific Recommendations:

1. Add more scenes showing Quirrell's suspicious behavior earlier in the story, but subtly enough to maintain the mystery.
2. Develop a stronger visual motif for the connection between Harry and Voldemort throughout the story, not just in the final confrontation.
3. Create more direct conflict between Harry and the Dursleys early on to establish stronger emotional stakes for Harry's new life at Hogwarts.
4. Consider incorporating more dynamic Quidditch sequences as they offer excellent opportunities for visual spectacle while advancing character development.

These adjustments would enhance the cinematic potential while maintaining the core strengths of the story.
